One of the four key objectives arising from the Christie Commission on the Future Delivery of Public Services in Scotland is a greater integration of public services at a local level driven by better partnership, collaboration and effective local delivery. With public budgets coming under increasing scrutiny, and the recent report from Audit Scotland - identifying the pressure to deliver better value better quality transport is growing.

The demographic changes with people living longer and the strategy of supporting the elderly to live at home will only increase the pressure on transport providers to meet increased demand. Transport integration by multiple organisations is perceived as a very complex process, but with significant funding constraints, introduction of Personal Budgets and the general need by members of the public to access more flexible transport services, integration is key to ensuring client needs are met whilst providing long term sustainability to transport operators. This half-day seminar will showcase examples of practical delivery with policy makers, service managers, and service providers explaining how they have overcome barriers and secured practical solutions.
